Ad Memoriam



We learned with great sadness that **Professor Emeritus Daniel Vandepitte** passed away on June 21 after a brief illness. He was 94 years old.

Prof. Vandepitte has been a very long time chairman of the ECCS working group TWG8.4 shells and under his successful leadership four editions of the ECCS European Recommendations for buckling of steel shells were drawn. These recommendations were valid during more than a quarter of a century. He contributed significantly to the knowledge on the stability of steel shell tructures and his influence reaches until today.

Prof. Vandepitte was from 1987 to 1993 chairman of Technical Committee 8 – structural stability and led the discussions about the gaps in the European codes.

ECCS is very thankful for the huge expertise shared with the European and International scientific community.

On behalf of all our colleagues, sincere condolences to his wife Mrs Vandepitte, his family, his numerous friends and colleagues.
